





Musical Instruments Played on the Trail

	<p>Military bugle—The bugle was used to signal troops. The soldier was dependent on the bugler to inform him of almost every action from time to rise to the order to retreat in time of battle.</p>
	<p>Rattles were used by Native Americans dating back to historic times. They were used as a method of keeping rhythm during tribal dances. The rhythm the rattle helps keep during the dance is unforgettable – something that resonates to the very soul, helping make the ceremony a spiritual experience.</p>
	<p>Tin whistle or pennywhistle. These have been popular musical instruments for hundreds of years. During the Trail days many musical instruments might have been heard including the mandolin, fiddle, guitar, banjo, and tin whistle.</p>
	<p>The Jaw Harp is a musical instrument held between the teeth. This instrument has been used for more than 400 years in Europe. Evidence has been found of Spaniards bringing Jaw Harps to America as early as the late 1500's. In 1677, 100 Jaw Harps were among the trade items given as payment for an Indian tract of land. The instrument was quite popular during the Trail days. It is sometimes referred to a Jews Harp or mouth harp.</p>
